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Graduate Education: A Shift in Focus

As a professional degree program, masters-level social work education requires a shift in focus from learning performance (getting A's) to learning outcome (building skills)

Your clients nor your future employers will care about your GPA. What they will care about is what skills and abilities do you possess and can you apply them in practice

Field education is about progressive, integrative applied learning. This involves learning with supervision, learning from mistakes, and seeking and using feedback





What is Field Education?

Field education (field placement, practicum, experiential education) is the applied learning, real-world training portion of the MSW curriculum.

- It is a course!!! SW 515 & SW 691
- What? experiential learning & applied practice
- Where? A variety of settings where social work is practiced

Field education is the opportunity for you to take what you learn in the classroom and apply and practice these concepts and skills in a real world learning environment where social work takes place.



How is Field Different from a Job?

- In many ways your field experience will feel like a job.
- As a profession, we believe it is critical for you to learn and practice in the real world environments where social work takes place.
- Field allows you to practice as a pre-licensed professional before you have your MSW
- Your Educational Agreement with the agency is your key learning tool and will guide your experience.
- Field education is 25% of your MSW education and training
- National labor law recognizes the need and importance for educational practicums.



Why is Field Important?

- Commit and practice the core values of the social work profession
- Prepare to become the provider of service to the clients and community you will be serving
- Engage in critical thinking and self-reflection
- Understand use of self in relation to your impact on others
- Begin developing your identity and professional brand as a social worker

Everything you do in field is a learning opportunity.





What Will I Do In Field?

Learn transferrable social work skills

Understand "use of self" and develop your professional identity

Integrate classroom and field learning experiences

Develop critical thinking and self-reflection skills



Developing CSWE Social Work Competencies and Skills in Field

Practice and apply classroom theories and concepts in a real-world setting Practice navigating ethical concerns according to the NASW/ABSW Code of Ethics

Practice skills and behaviors that lead to core competency development

Where will my Field Placement be?



Student, MSW candidate

- "Local" options in SE Michigan and Northern Ohio, most in Ann Arbor and Detroit
- <u>Most</u> students travel an average of 30 to 60 minutes to get to field
- Spring/Summer term national and international field placement options



How do I Get There?

- You are responsible for your transportation to your field site
- If you don't drive or have a car, indicate this on your application, as this does limit options
- Transportation options (Carpooling, Ann Arbor Transportation Authority)







Entering Your Field Placement

Entering field means you are entering a new community.

Field sites and field instructors understand you're a student there to learn.

However, as a professional graduate social work student you are expected to have skills and attributes in the following areas: <u>UM-SSW Technical Standards</u>

- Communication
- Intellectual and Cognitive Skills
- Emotional and Behavioral Readiness





Field Education Time Commitment

- Every student will spend 16-24 hours per week in field during the semesters of your field courses
- 14 field course credits for 16 mo, 20 mo and MasterTrack students = 912 hours over 3 terms in field (4 terms for students in the part-time program)
- 12 field course credits for advanced standing students = 684 hours over 3 terms in field

Be prepared for this time commitment



Best Approaches to Field: 5 Pieces of Advice

- Own your learning and manage your expectations
- Learn to function with discomfort, anxiety, and ambiguity
- Be willing to make mistakes
- Be patient with all you have to learn
- Want, seek and use feedback

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Composing and Submitting Your Field Application

Identify your priorities and select placement options

Goal statement: 1-2 page written statement that we share with potential field placements to give them an idea of your knowledge, skills and interests

• Follow the goal statement guidelines to compose

Resume: Same as any other resume, but with any social work experience or skills emphasized

- Use your UMich email address on your resume! This is how agencies/field instructors will contact you.
- The Office of Career Services (CSO) website has <u>resume guidelines and examples</u>

BOTH: Email your drafts to the CSO Writing Center before you submit (optional); must be submitted to CSO (ssw-cso@umich.edu) at least 2 weeks prior to field application deadline.

What if I Don't Get an Interview or Am Not Accepted After I Interview?

- Don't panic
- Reach out to your field faculty to discuss your situation and circumstances
- You may need to improve on your interview skills
- You may need to reflect on where you are in your skill development
- Field faculty work as a team. We will work together to find the next opportunity for you.



Preparing to Start Field

Check in with the field instructor before the start date about any additional requirements you'll need to complete

- Read: <u>Are You a Joy?</u>
- Health screenings & drug testing
- Background checks
- HR application
- Make sure you are responding to emails from your umich account in a timely manner!
- Attend pre-field orientation over Welcome Week
- READ the syllabus and review Canvas site

- Independent
- Flexible
- Efficient in a fast-paced environment
- Organized



Course Requirements

- Interpersonal Practice or Welfare of Children and Families Pathway *
- SW 626 School Social Work Assessments
- SW 628 School Social Work Interventions
- SW515/SW691: 500 Field Hours of direct service with children and youth.

*Exceptions can be made for students in the Community Change pathway and the Global pathway, if the field placement can accommodate 500 hours of direct practice with children and youth, and a meeting is held with Beth Sherman to formulate a specific plan.

 - Form 310 Recommendation for Temporary Approval Request Form
